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Mountville Historical Society and Museum News

The Mountville Museum, like many other historic sites and museums, had to close its doors for the 2020 season due to the COVID pandemic. The Museum staff is looking forward to re-opening this summer, if the COVID situation allows. The display will feature items from the Robert Zink family collection of Mountville memorabilia that Bob, Lois, and their daughter have gathered over forty years. Items in the collection range from badges from the fraternal lodge of the Knights of the Mystic Chain to a plot drawing of a site when Mountville was known as Mount Pleasant to relics from Mountville Civil War veterans. The Zinks have graciously donated this collection to the Mountville Museum, and the Historical Society is extremely grateful to them for the preservation of such a large amount of Mountville history that might otherwise have been lost. Bob has been a dedicated Historical Society board member and Museum volunteer since 2013. He has also provided a wealth of knowledge about Mountville's history and will gladly share all of this with the public when the museum re-opens.

On a sadder note, the Museum volunteers mourn the loss of two of our members, Faye Mowrer and Sue Wile, who passed away in 2020. Faye worked with the displays and exhibits since 2017 and had the patience of a saint when dealing with all the minutiae of labeling and arranging artifacts. She worked with donors to see that the display of their items was satisfactory to them. Sue Wile was a founding Historical Society board member and Museum volunteer since 2013. When things got hectic in the Museum, she was a calming influence and was an expert at arranging the hanging picture display. She and her husband, Ken, were long-time Mountville residents and knew a great deal about the town's history and its people. She had an interest in antiques and donated many items to the Museum. No one can replace these two in our hearts and in their service to preserving Mountville's history. They will be greatly missed.

-- *Meets fourth Tuesdays at 6:00 p.m. via Zoom*




Take Care of Those Pesky Mosquitos!

An important part of mosquito control around homes is making sure that mosquitoes do not have a place to lay their eggs. It is important to monitor standing water sources because mosquitoes need water for several stages of their life cycle.

Here are some precautionary measures Mountville residents and property owners can take to help eliminate mosquito-breeding areas:

- Dispose of cans, buckets, plastic containers, ceramic pots, or containers that hold water.
- Properly dispose of discarded tires that can collect water. Stagnant water is where most mosquitoes breed.
- Have clogged roof gutters cleaned every year as the leaves from trees have a tendency to plug drains.
- Empty plastic wading pools when not in use.
- Turn over wheelbarrows and do not let water stagnate in birdbaths.
- Aerate ornamental ponds or stock them with fish.
- Drain temporary puddles of water or fill with dirt.
- Clean and chlorinate swimming pools not in use and remove any water that may collect on pool covers.
- Empty and change the water in bird baths, fountains, wading pools, rain barrels and potted plant trays at least once a week to eliminate potential mosquito habitats.



ONLY RAIN IN THE STORM DRAINS!

Spring and summer are typically the seasons when lawn care professionals and homeowners work to fertilize lawns to make them healthier and more attractive. While you are attempting to improve your yard, you could also be harming the environment.

Doing the following will protect water quality:

■ **Do Not Over-Fertilize Your Yard:** Over-fertilization will not increase plant growth, but the excess will run off your yard and down the storm drain, polluting the stormwater. Fertilizers, herbicides, and pesticides, pollute the stormwater and endanger wildlife. In addition, fertilizer nourishes algae that grows in creeks, lake, and rivers, depleting oxygen in the water, which can kill fish and other aquatic wildlife. Statistics show that 40 – 70% of fertilizers run off to surface waters or filter into the groundwater.* No matter how far away you live from a body of water your property is part of a watershed. So, how you care for your lawn can affect both water quality and water supply.

■ **Do Not Put Leaves or Grass Clippings into the Storm Drain:** Covered or clogged drains significantly contribute to street and yard flooding. Storm drains are not meant to accept debris or garbage, but to take away overflow rainwater to prevent flooding of home and property. Please assist by removing debris from the stormwater drain grids located by your home.

■ **Remember - The Storm Drainage Systems Different from the Sanitary Sewer System:** Some people think storm drains are part of the sewer system that flow to a wastewater treatment plant. Actually, any material that flows into the storm drainage system goes directly to our local rivers and streams. The sanitary sewer system takes wastewater from our homes and businesses and purifies it before returning the water to the river.

Please assist the Borough in its efforts to fight against stormwater pollution. Remember, only rain goes down the storm drain!

Are Fido and Fifi Safe?

It's a warm, sunny day and the perfect opportunity for you to take "Fifi" for a stroll around the neighborhood or to let "Fido" outside to soak up the sunshine and fresh air. If you decide to take advantage of the nice weather, remember that it is extremely important to be aware of state and local ordinances regarding dog ownership. As a dog owner you are responsible for your dog along with any personal injury or property damage caused by your dog. Dog owners must keep their dogs under control at all times, to prevent dogs from running at large. Attaching your dog to a leash or lead, or confining dogs to your property using a fence, are a means to establish control.

Dogs are personal property and their owners are responsible for damages caused by their dog. Things can go wrong if you do not control your dog and legal actions could be a consequence. These situations include personal injury from a dog bite, property damage due to dogs digging holes or trampling landscaped yards, dogs becoming aggressive and fighting other dogs. Furthermore, your dog is in potential danger if he/she leaves your property.

Remember that properly confining your dog is not only important for the safety of your dog and everyone around you, but it is the law in Pennsylvania. Failure to do so could cost you money, time, emotional distress and possibly the loss of your dog.


Mountville Borough echoes these sentiments and thanks Pam for her years of service. Hoping this next chapter in her life will be filled with many moments that become cherished memories.
